| 12.    |                                   | <p>This course teaches students to listen better by drawing their attention to the elements of spoken English that make it so hard for them to understand.</p> <p>Moreover, the course covers listening, speaking, grammar and pronunciation and teaches students how English really works; meaning students can apply what they learn more readily and with more confidence outside the classroom.</p> <p>Besides, the course gives students time to formulate the ideas and language they want to use before they speak, thereby helping to build both spoken fluency and accuracy.</p>                    |



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|     | Moreover, the reference of this course is, <b>Face2Face</b> , informed by the Cambridge English Corpus and its vocabulary syllabus has been mapped to the English Vocabulary Profile, meaning students learn the language they really need to know at each CEFR level.  |
| 13. | <b>Course requirement (course policy):</b> It is mandatory for the students to attend the class as scheduled. They will not pass the exams if they do not attend the class regularly. Besides, if their absence goes beyond maximum rate, that is 10% out of 90 Credit hours, they will be considered as failures in this subject. Sometimes, if a student asks permission prior to class hours, s/he will be granted this opportunity if s/he provides reasonable justifications. Moreover, not attending classes more than for more than 9 Hours will deprive the students of the class activities: individual and group participation and discussion, which in turn affect his/ her grade allocated for that purpose.  |
| 14. | <b>Teaching and Learning Method:</b><br>The course follows Student Centered Learning. This means students should prepare themselves before enter the class and be ready to play the role of a coordinator with their colleagues in the class. The role of the instructor is just a facilitator or coordinator with the students. Besides, the course follows other types of instructional methods in order to be more attractive by the learners, such as; Cooperative, KWL, Presentations, Debate, Class discussion, Construction of summaries by students, Assignment to outline certain supplementary readings, Library research on topics or problems, Open textbook study, Making of posters by students and so on.  |
